

Partnership Plans 2023 to 2024

The Moorlands Together Safer and Stronger Communities Partnership (CSP) is made up of a number of organisations that work together to make our district safer. These organisations include Staffordshire Moorlands District Council, Staffordshire County Council, Staffordshire Police, Your Housing Group, Staffordshire Housing Group, Staffordshire Fire and Rescue Service, local Clinical Commissioning Group and probation service providers. Funding to support partnership activity is provided by Staffordshire Commissioner for Police, Fire and Crime and by individual agencies through mainstream budgets.

The Moorlands Together Safer and Stronger Communities Strategy Group considers the information contained within an annual strategic assessment to establish local priorities. The priorities are then reflected in the community safety partnership plan, which sets out what the CSP will do to address these priorities. There are five main priorities for 2023/24:

The strategic priorities for Staffordshire Moorlands CSP for 2023/2024:

- □ Anti-Social Behaviour
- □ Domestic Abuse
- □ Rural Crime (including burglary and vehicle theft)
- □ Fraud
- □ Vulnerable People

The Moorlands Together Safer and Stronger Communities Partnership Plan builds on the five priorities set out by the Staffordshire Commissioner for Police, Fire and Rescue and Crime, which are:

- A flexible and responsive service Understand and deal with what matters to communities, respond promptly to incidents and work with partners to solve problems and prevent them from getting worse. This will mean that crime and ASB reduces, our roads are safer and confidence in Staffordshire Police increases.
- **Prevent harm and protect people** Prevent harm and protect people (particularly children and those that are vulnerable) by ensuring they are appropriately safeguarded and receive the help and support they need.
- **Support victims and witnesses** Ensure victims and witnesses are provided with exceptional specialist support services so they feel able to cope and recover from the impact of crime and ASB.

- **Reduce offending and reoffending** Ensure people are challenged and supported to make life choices that will prevent them from offending and perpetrators don't reoffend. Doing so will mean fewer victims of crime.
- A more effective criminal justice system Ensure Staffordshire Police, the Crown Prosecution Service, Courts, the National Probation Service and HM Prison Service all work seamlessly so that effective justice is delivered more quickly.

It should be acknowledged some activity is centrally commissioned and the Moorlands Together Safer and Stronger Communities Partnership plan aims to compliment, not duplicate, any activity based on local needs.

The CSP will also be adopting a Place Based approach with public services working in partnership with each other, the voluntary and business sectors and communities to plan, design, resource, build and deliver services around people, families and communities in the most disadvantaged communities to support them to improve their life opportunities and outcomes.
